Curriculum Objective	This core unit introduces students to advanced studies in contemporary theologies of ministry as a foundation for doctoral research in ministry. The unit aims to equip the student with advanced knowledge of contextual theology through the study of a diverse range of theological paradigms. The student will be encouraged to develop a deeper understanding of the interconnected nature of Christian thought, in the process utilising a complex level of theological reflection and engagement with current pastoral and practical initiatives.

Curriculum Objective	This core unit, which builds on RP895 and RP896, is designed to furnish the candidate with a highly polished draft thesis proposal and research plan as the coursework components of the degree are fulfilled.
Outcomes	<p>Candidates should be able to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Understand the nature, purpose, style and content of the research thesis proposal in the Doctor of Ministry program and critically evaluate such proposals; • Generate a methodology suitable to their topic • Write a highly polished thesis topic proposal; • Develop an research strategy appropriate to the topic area, the literature and quality of research required • Critically evaluate their grasp of the skills needed to undertake a particular research project and develop strategies to cover any gaps; • Appreciate and apply ethical considerations and protocols concerning research that involves human subjects.

Ethical considerations and protocols concerning research involving human subjects; 3. The particular thesis topic proposal of the candidate 4.
